- You talk about pretending you love your husband more than your kids and you even say dishonesty is the best policy. Isn't honesty critical for a good relationship?
- What do you mean communication is overrated? Isn't that what most people need to work on to have better relationships?
- What about men working to improve the relationship? Don't they have to work on the relationship too?
- You say sex is better after marriage, but for a lot of people, it's not. So what do you say to them?
